Maximize your Child's Learning Potential

Hints and Tips for Parents

Q. Now that I've discovered my child's learning style, what's next?

A. Discovering your child's learning style can open up a world of richer learning opportunities and stronger family communication. For example, if you've just found out that your child is Auditory, encourage her love of noise-making toys by setting aside more time for the two of you to make music together. (Pots and pans are terrific instruments!) When problems arise, sit down together and talk things through. Auditory learners are often great listeners. They also need to hear that they are special! So, be sure to tell her you love her often.

If you've found that your child is Kinesthetic, be sure and provide lots of hands-on activities – from finger painting to playing tag in the backyard. When it comes to homework, think tactile. Kinesthetic kids are best able to understand when they can get their bodies involved with the task at hand. For example, young tactile learners are more apt to learn the alphabet by feeling letter-shaped blocks in addition to hearing sounds and seeing letter shapes. Also, in addition to telling your kinesthetic child you love her, show her with lots of cuddles and hugs.

If your child is Visual, you can help her with homework by using charts and flash cards. When communicating with her, remember that she learns through her eyes. For example, maybe you have been telling her all week to make her bed and she's still not doing it. Next time, take her into her room and start actually making the bed as you tell her. Giving her visual cues helps the message sink in! Visual children also need visual reminders that you love them. A couple of love-notes in the lunch box or a snack arranged into a smiley face can mean a lot to a visual child!

Q. How can I make sure my child's learning style is being encouraged at school?

A. Visit your child's classroom and observe some of the lessons. Ideally, there should be a mix of visual, auditory and kinesthetic lessons. If not, bring it up with his teacher. Explain what works best for your child. For example, "My son learns kinesthetically. Is there some way we could make his math lessons more hands-on?"

Q. Based on her learning style, are there certain family outings my child will like more than others?

A. It's a great idea to use your child's learning style as a guide for family outings! If your child is kinesthetic, she may not appreciate a "look but don't touch" place like an art gallery as much as a visual child would. However, she may really enjoy going to the park and taking nature hikes and camping trips. Likewise, a Visual child may enjoy visits to art museums, planetariums and special buildings, but she may not be as attracted to a hands-on adventure like a horseback ride. And, an Auditory child may love concerts, children's operettas and musicals more than the other two types of learners would. However, continue to introduce new adventures that you think your child may enjoy – even if they don't exactly fit her learning style. Try many different things and let her tell you which ones she especially likes.

Q. I can't decide whether my child is a Visual or Auditory learner. He seems to excel in both areas.

A. The fact is, each of us is a mixture of all three learning styles: Visual, Auditory, and Kinesthetic. While most of us have a single predominant learning style, a few of us are strongest in more areas than one. Keep encouraging both of your child's learning styles. Offer him products that develop both his visual and auditory natures. There's nothing wrong with a child who can learn equally well in two different ways!

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
